Successful Reintegration into the Community Static Risk Assessment (SRA) Offender's Risk to Recidivate A 41-year-old male with a criminal history of burglaries and drug related offenses with prior prison terms was placed on Mandatory Supervision for burglary in the 2nd degree. He was referred to the Adult 60% Programs Center by his Probation Officer and began the program in August of 2019. When he first began the program, he expressed he was tired of living the life he was leading and wanted to make positive ■ PRCS changes for himself. Despite his positive outlook in the early stages of the program, he ran into barriers 50% ■ MS due to work which directly impacted his attendance; however, prior to being discharged for his poor ■ FP attendance, he put forth efforts to manage the conflict and was ultimately successful in maintaining attendance without being discharged. Throughout the program he recognized areas in his life in which he was able to develop and eventually thrive. He expressed Moral Reconation Therapy helped him see things in a different way by helping with reasoning and decision-making. His three main take-aways from his time at Adult Programs Center was developing motivation to be successful, maintaining sobriety, and keeping sight of his future goals. During a search of the residence, officers located and seized a loaded 9mm semi-automatic 18% 10% handgun, live ammunition, over two ounces of suspected cocaine, and drug sales paraphernalia. The male was arrested for firearm and drug sales charges, as well as a violation of probation.















Success Story





Success Story

A client was referred to our program last October. Many of our AB 109 clientele arrive without a clear direction for their lives. However, this new arrival was different because he showed up with an agenda and goals he desired to accomplish. Upon arrival at our house, this client immediately felt at home and relieved, as could be seen from his demeanor. We utilized the blackout period, all new arrivals go through, to conduct weekly appointments and get all their right-to-work paperwork in order. Within a week, this person accepted a "get well" job. This wasn't our client's dream job, but he nonetheless took the opportunity in stride and was conscientious in performing required duties. This client proceeded to use his first paycheck to make payments toward restitution fines and overdue child support. All these little successes boosted the client's self-esteem and pride. A few months later, he came into our office and asked for a favor. The client needed a written character reference from us because he was actively being considered for a promotion and full-time employment. We agreed and furnished a character reference letter. Our client nailed the interview and became proud of his job and work. This client's attitude and work ethic has proven contagious to the other clientele we serve. For example, based on this client's efforts and successes, it has help lead other in-house clients get jobs with the same company. Recently, this client asked for an extension as he wasn't ready to leave the program. He wanted an opportunity to save a little more money to secure housing before leaving the program. Our staff agreed to the extension, and we are proud to note that this client is currently on track to soon move into a place of his own. Our client completed intensive outpatient services with us while in our sober living environment and said the most helpful thing he learned from that experience, was that an honest and simple life is a good life. Since arriving into our care, he is on track for a better life than what he






PUBLIC DEFENDER AB 109 DATA TRACKERS FY 21/22 - 2nd Quarter

BACKGROUND

On October 4th, 2018, the CCP awarded contracts to eight (8) Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) to provide services to male and female offenders reentering the community through sober living environments (SLEs), educational, employment, and/or vocational services, DUI education, and case management services. AB 109 funding totaling \$5,531,091 was awarded through a competitive Request for Proposal (RFP) process. The contract term was three years (January 1, 2019 - December 31, 2021); however, contracts were extended an additional year through December 31, 2022 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The new RFP term will be effective for three years, January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025. The estimated amount for this new RFP is \$7.9 million. Below is the proposed RFP timeline:
