She had a referral for ETR that resulted in obtaining a position with City Serve, in which she excelled in the program. In this program, she learned inventory and quality control routines, and shipping and receiving processes. 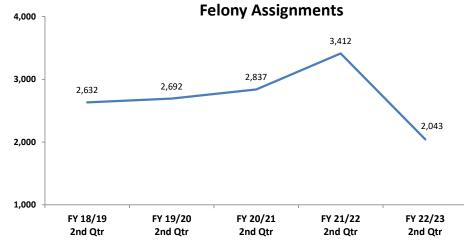


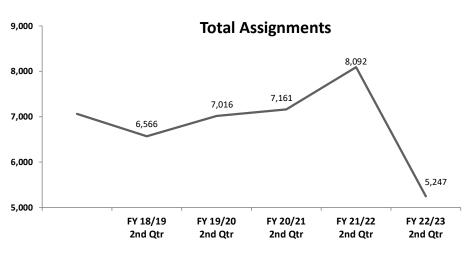

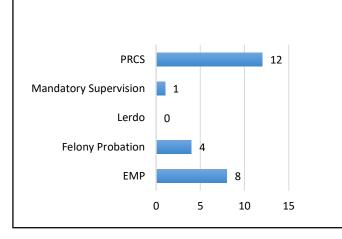

#### **Education Level of Enrolled**



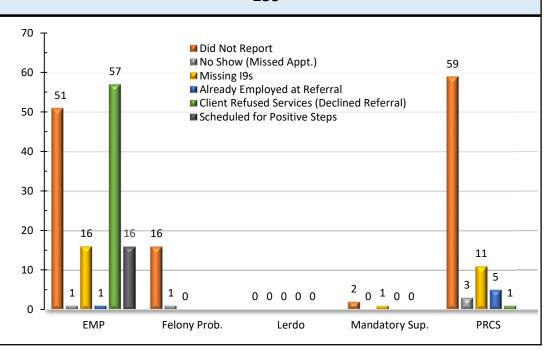

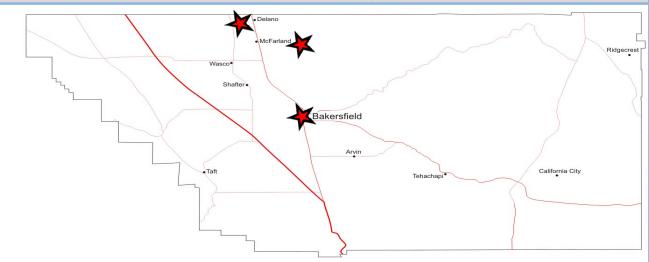

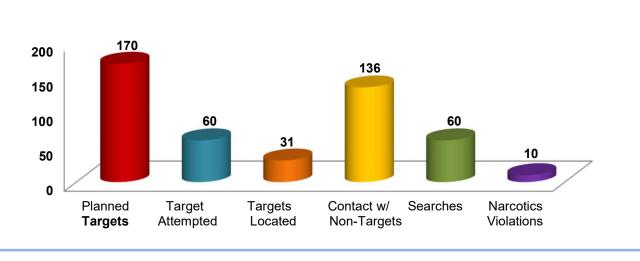

#### **BACKGROUND**

On October 5, 2022, the CCP approved the evaluation committee's recommendation to fund Bakersfield Recovery Services (BRS), Inc, DBA Jason's Retreat, and DBA Capistrano Community for Women to provide sober-living environment services from January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025. On December 13, 2022, the Board awarded a contract (Agreement #678-2022) executed by Eric Sanders, BRS Executive Director per the submitted proposal.

On February 10, 2023, BRS Board President notified the Probation Department to remove Eric L. Sanders from all forms, contracts or agreements, and accounts. Per their letter, the appointed authorized signer is now Stephenie Carroll, Program Director.

Additionally, BRS' proposal listed the men's sober-living addresses incorrectly. Below are the corrected addresses:

- 601 Knotts Street was listed as 601 N. Kern St (corner of Knotts and Kern; property faces Knotts)
- 2040 N. Kern Street was listed as 2041 N. Kern Street (Transitional housing only)

#### **BACKGROUND**

On December 13, 2022, the County of Kern entered into Agreement #682-2022 with One Door Community Resource and Recovery Center ("One Door") to provide case management services for male and female AB 109 clients effective January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2025, in an amount not to exceed \$300,000.

The original proposal from One Door included Target Area 3, Case Management and Target Area 4, Other Evidence-Based Practices (EBP) or Best Practices with a requested total amount of \$1,136,550. However, the Evaluation Committee recommended funding for the Case Management portion in the amount of \$300,000 to One Door.

Within the executed Agreement #682-2022, some of the services related to Target Area 4 were inadvertently included, therefore, the following sections need to be amended.

#### 1) Page 21, remove Sections H and I (Target Area 4)

- H. CONTRACTOR shall use the evidence-based Matrix Model to treat client drug addiction by providing individual/conjoint therapy, early recovery, relapse prevention, family education, social support, urine testing.
- I. CONTRACTOR shall utilize the integrated therapeutic model which incorporates addressing cognitive behaviors, motivational enhancements, couples and family therapy, individual support/expressive psychotherapy and psychoeducation, twelve step facilitation, and group therapy and social supports.

#### 2) Page 22, remove viii (Target Area 4)

iii. Number of drug and breathalyzer tests administered, and the number of positive drug and breathalyzer tests.

#### 3) Page 22, section J, i. - revise total number of clients served from 300 to 162.

- J. CONTRACTOR will also follow these guiding principles:
  - Provide case management and reentry planning services for a minimum of 162 eligible participants.

#### 4) Exhibit "B", Page 25 - revise budget

- Remove drug test supplies (applies to Target Area 4 only)
- Add Transportation Cost of \$3,850/year for bus passes or mileage reimbursement

SUBJECT: Probation Department's Request for FY 22/23 Additional AB 109 Base Funds

The Probation Department is requesting FY 22/23 Additional AB 109 Base Funds in the amount of \$1,537,438 which is keeping the existing 35.56% of the base allocation. The Department will use these funds to enhance AB 109 operations and activities for the Probation Department.

To better meet the growing demands of serving the AB 109 population, the Department plans on leasing a new building on Sillect Ave. to house all adult supervision services in one location. The Department has undertaken additional construction and remodeling to adapt the space for our purposes, but the building will need to be furnished and outfitted with the required technology and equipment upon completion. It is critical officers conducting case management to have an adequate environment to meet with the offenders under their supervision and provide the necessary services to redirect their behavior in a pro-social manner. The purchase of cubicles, office furniture, tables and chairs, and various technology related items to accommodate supervision units and the Adult Programs Center will make the Probation Department more efficient in its delivery of Accountability and Opportunity to the AB 109 population. In addition to the furniture for the new building, the Department is also requesting funds to upgrade workstations for administrative staff.

A significant portion of the Department's current locations do not have adequate or consistent signage identifying them as part of the Probation Department, so we are requesting funding to purchase eighteen signs that will both make our various locations easily recognizable to the public and more professional in appearance. Additionally, the Department is requesting funding to purchase six metal detectors to prevent the introduction of dangerous weapons to our unsecure offices located throughout the County. This purchase will help ensure the safety and security of staff and the public engaged in services throughout our offices. The Department is also requesting funding to purchase two patrol vehicles to continue to replenish our aging fleet.

The Department is also requesting funds to replace the HVAC on our use of force training room. Due to the increasing complexity and sophistication of the population we supervise and changes to best practices, the training room HVAC replacement is necessary to ensure a safe and properly regulated area to facilitate effective training techniques. And, as part of the Department's commitment to evidence-based practices, we are also requesting funding for Train-the-Trainer classes to sustain our own in-house training for facilitators of evidence-based curriculums.

Public Defender represents a significant portion of these persons. Our mandate is Constitutional and statutory. Under the Sixth Amendment to the United States Constitution, persons accused of committing crimes, who cannot afford to hire private counsel, are entitled to appointed counsel. Pursuant to California Government Code § 27706, the Public Defender is charged with representation of persons qualifying for appointed counsel. It is not possible to precisely align or attribute a particular defendant or crime to Realignment. Consequently, the department utilizes the AB 109 allocation to meet – as effectively as we

can - the department's significant Realignment driven caseload.

Consistent with prior years, the department is requesting appropriations approximating one-half, or 50%, of those made to the District Attorney.

Title: District Attorney's Request for FY 21-22 AB109 Growth Funds

**Background:** The District Attorney's Office is requesting FY 21/22 Growth Funds in the

amount of \$387,612. The District Attorney's Office will use these funds to

enhance services and adjust to the continuing pressures upon prosecuting agencies related to AB 109.

In May of 2023, the District Attorney's Office will be transitioning to a new case-management system. This system, "Prosecutor by Karpel," is relied upon by multiple District Attorney's Offices throughout California as well as multiple other states. A hallmark of the system is the ability for the District Attorney's Office to introduce [nearly] "paperless" workflows. This is a stark contrast to current operations of the District Attorney's Office, which relies largely on the same methods and procedures used during the past four decades of case management. To facilitate this transition and make the best use of the technology already invested in, the District Attorney's Office would greatly benefit from laptop computers being made available to attorneys, who could research case information and evidence from anywhere they have internet access. The District Attorney's Office currently only has a few laptops available for use. Additionally, the transition to a paperless system will make scanning in current documents on all cases – new and old – a priority throughout the office. While the District Attorney's Office has some limited scanners available, having scanners on the desks of attorneys and clerical staff is essential to maximizing the benefits of the new case management system.

Finally, the Kern Regional Crime Lab, which serves 38 law enforcement agencies in Kern County on a very limited budget, suffered a setback this year in its Toxicology department. While the lab has received four new instruments through a CHP grant fund that will expand the ability to test all toxicology samples for a stunning 127 target compounds, the influx of new equipment overwhelmed the room temperature control capabilities of the lab, which resulted in an immediate need to add air conditioning resources to the lab. This project was essential because the climate

controls required at the lab are not merely for the employees comfort, they are essential to the proper operation of the instruments. This project was completed in November of 2022 at a cost of \$57,612, and due to the timing and urgency of the needed repairs, grant funding or other sources could not be requested for this project. The Kern Regional Crime lab faces extensive cost increases related to AB109 due to increased toxicological and testing on solid dosage drugs. The toxicology unit of the Kern Regional Crime Lab is the center of DUI investigations, as it processes nearly all DUI samples taken in the county, and the District Attorney requests growth funds to assist the Crime Lab in coping with this unforeseen cost.
