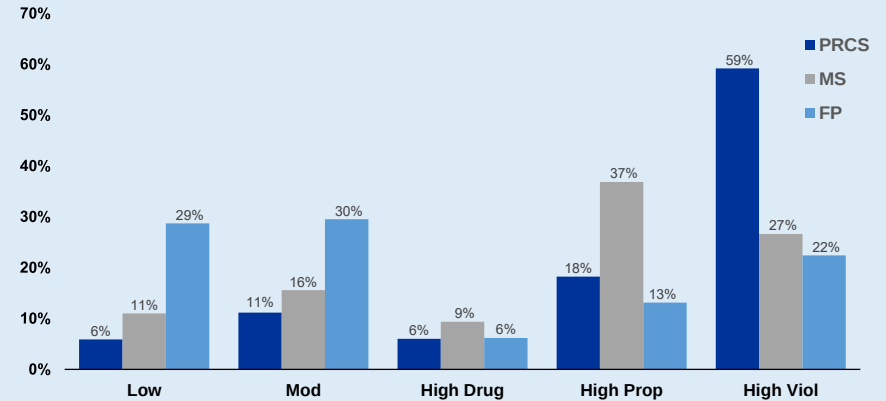

Commitment to a Safe Community

During this quarter, officers assigned to the Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) unit conducted a home call in the 900 block of Oxford Street in Delano. Officers contacted a subject who lived in the home of a PRCS offender. During the search, officers located a Palmetto State Army 9mm semi-auto handgun, a Panzer Arms 12-gauge shotgun, 2 Panzer Arms magazines loaded with 5 live 12-gauge ammunition rounds, 9 magazines loaded to full capacity with 9mm ammunition, one box of "Blazer" 9mm ammunition containing 30 live rounds, and two "Winchester" .45 caliber live ammunition rounds in the subject's possession. During the seize, the subject was determined to be a prohibited person. As a result, the subject was arrested for possession of a firearm by a felon and possession of ammunition by a prohibited person.

Static Risk Assessment (SRA) Offender's Risk to Recidivate

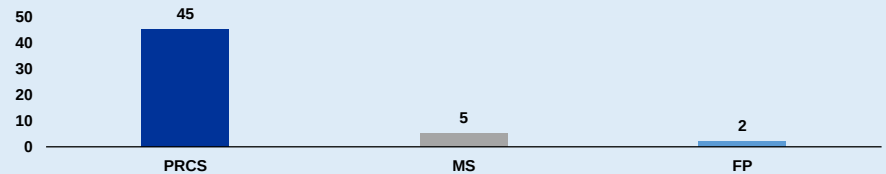

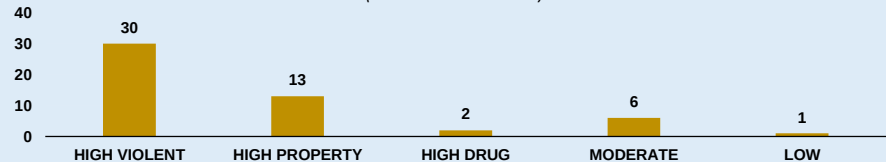

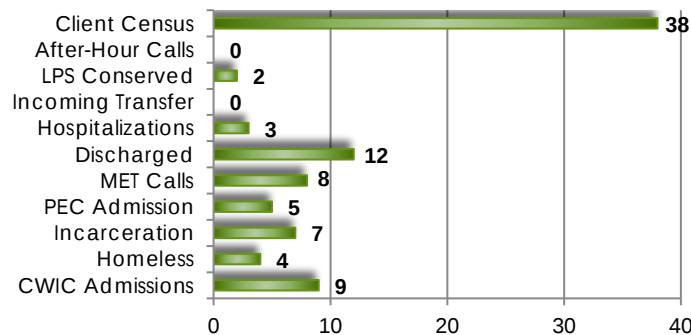
MH Data and Outcomes (n=7 prior; n=40 since Tx)



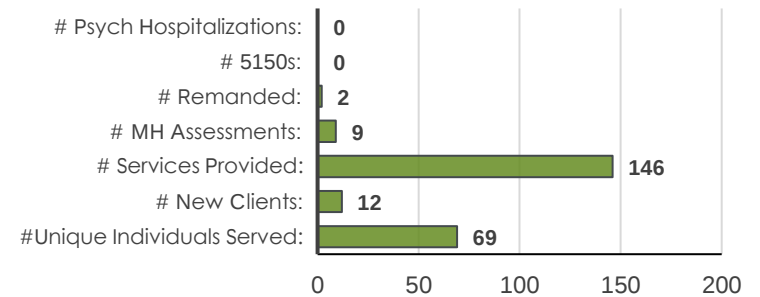
SUD Data and Outcomes (n=18 prior Tx; n=6 since Tx)

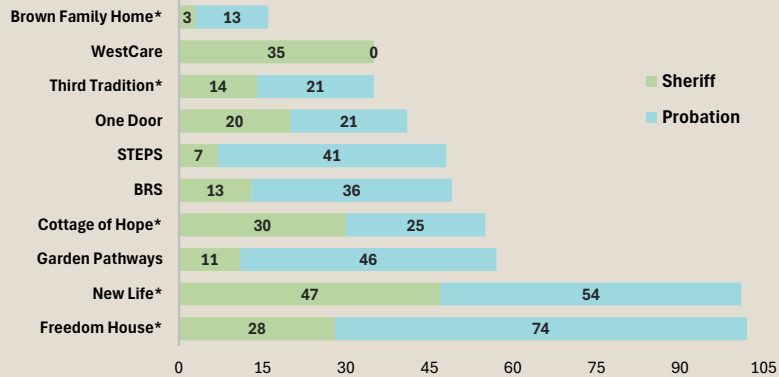

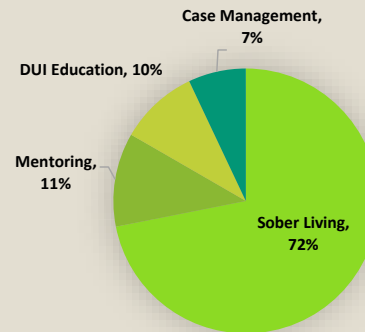

Enrollments

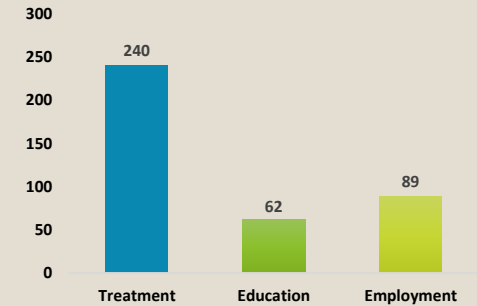


Participants by Service Type



Service Participation by SLE Clients*

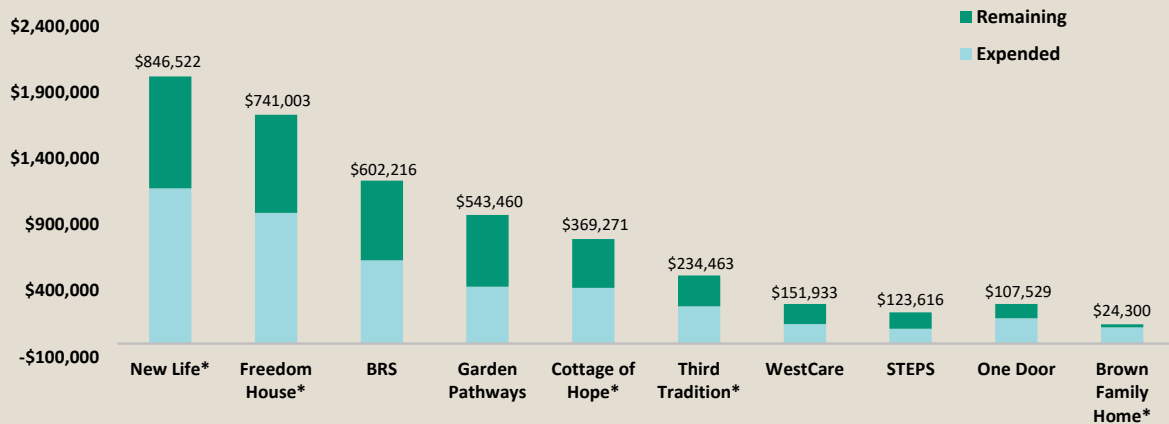

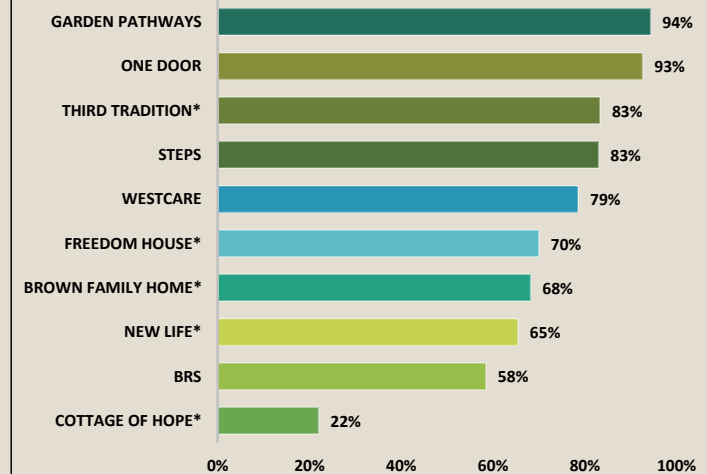
Success Story

Many of the Community-Based Organizations have seen some great successes for the participants going through the programs. In one of the Sober-Living Environments, a former AB 109 participant that had completed the program reached out to let staff know that since beginning courses at California State University, Bakersfield during their stay at the home, they have earned their bachelor's degree and certification in Drug and Alcohol Abuse Counseling and is actively working in the substance use disorder treatment field and maintaining their own sobriety. Retention Rate

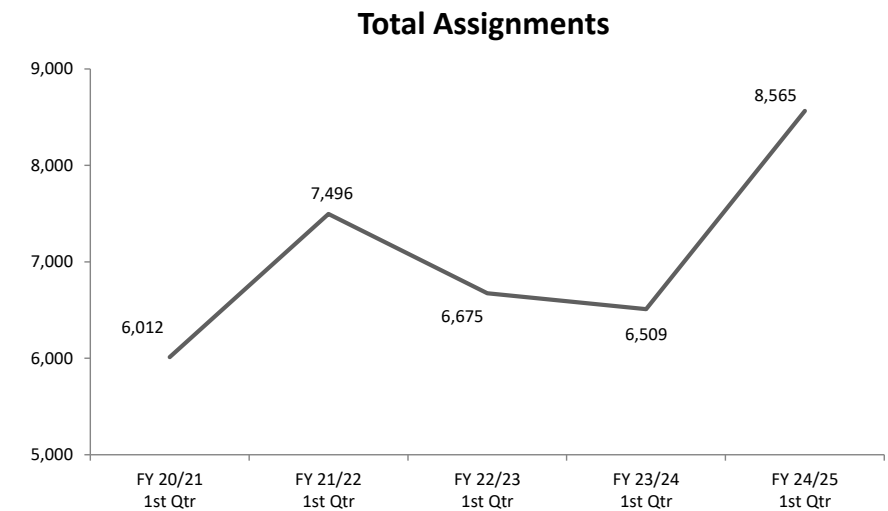
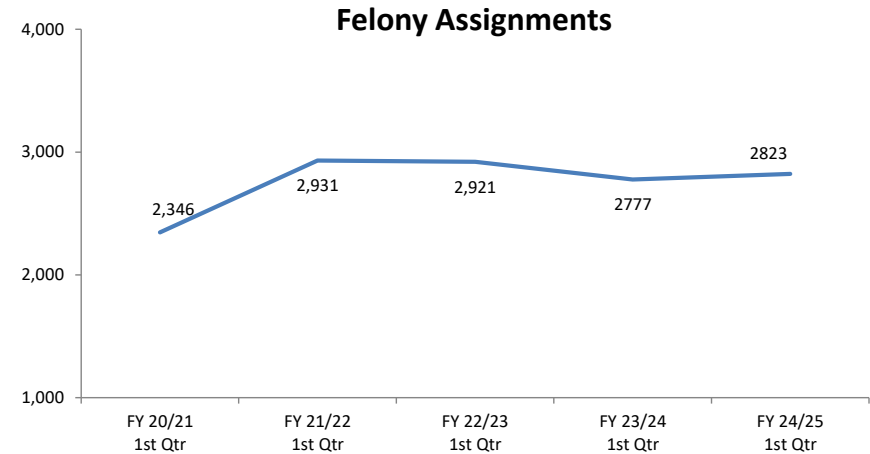

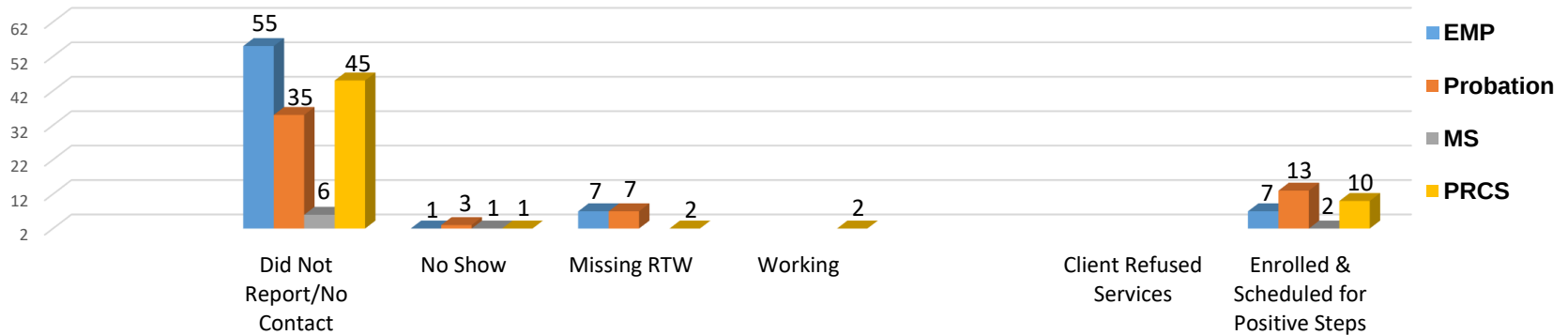

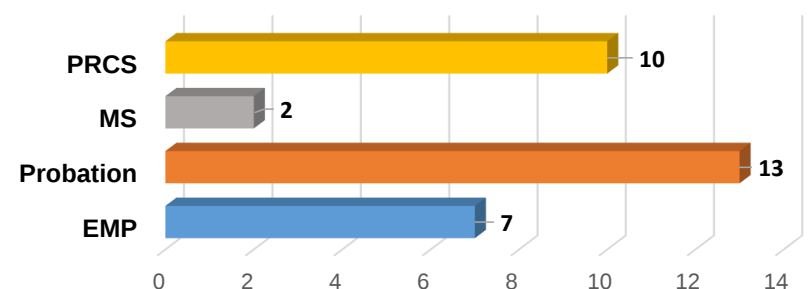

Number Enrolled by Offender Classification



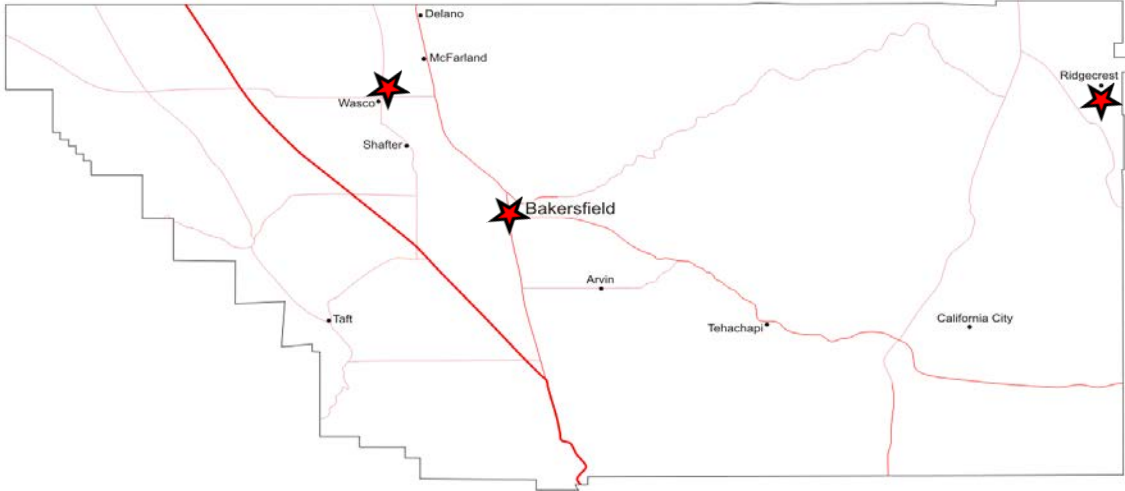
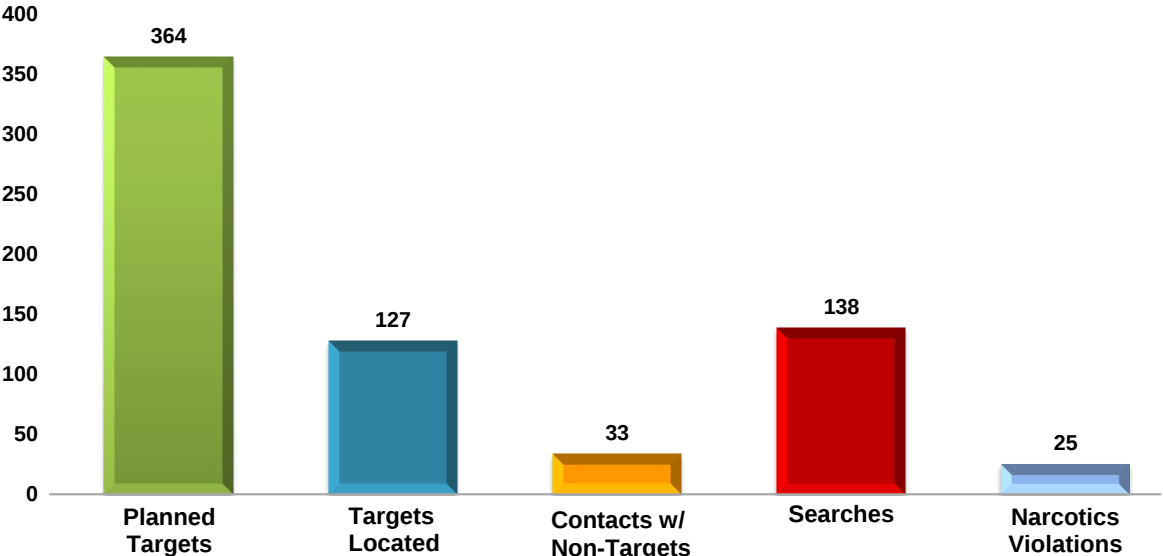

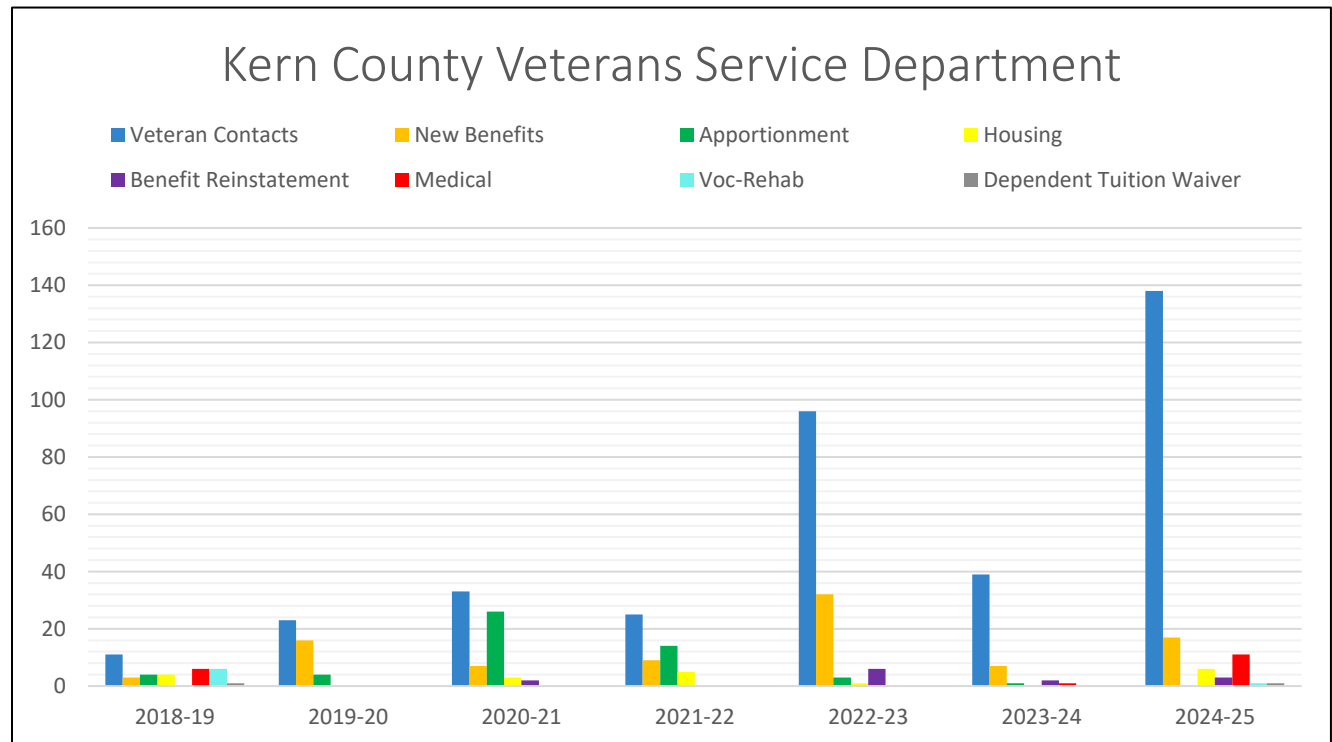
AB 109 DATA TRACKERS REPORT FY 24-25 QUARTER 1 (July 1, 2024- September 30, 2024)

The Kern County Veterans Service Department (KCVSD) has a dedicated Veterans Service Representative (VSR) designated to provide benefit advocacy and case management to veterans (and their families) at any stage in the criminal justice system. The initiative provides access to Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits, California Department of Veterans Affairs benefits, as well as referrals to other community groups in an effort to eliminate barriers to successful reintegration into the community and reduce the recidivism rate of veteran offenders.

Services Provided to Support Reintegration and Reduce Recidivism:

- Service-Connected Disability
- Apportionment
- Pension
- Medical
- Vocational Rehabilitation
- Housing Assistance
- CalVet Tuition Waiver for Dependents

KCVSD has established a direct line of communication to incarcerated veterans via Kern Valley State Prison psychologists; this provides an opportunity to assist these incarcerated veterans by filing claims related to psychological trauma suffered during their time in service. Staff and inmates have the means of communicating through Zoom on tablets provided by the state prison. Future goals of KCVSD is to develop similar connections within other institutions throughout Kern County.

ALLOCATION FROM CONTINGENCY FUND

Background: Employers' Training Resource (ETR) is requesting \$216,000 from the Community Corrections Partnership's (CCP's) Contingency Fund to cover the cost of Paid Work Experience (PWEX) for up to 16 additional participants plus associated Supportive Services. If approved, this will bring the total number of PWEX slots up to 32. Not all AB 109 participants are placed in PWEX; however, we've already enrolled 39 of our planned 125 participants for 2024-25 and expect to fill our original PWEX 16 slots well before the end of June. We had hoped to utilize Growth Funds for this but since there is no Growth Allocation this year, we are asking the CCP to consider using Contingency Funds to expand PWEX opportunities for our AB 109 clients.

Fiscal Impact: \$216,000
