While in APC, they completed 18 individual Effective Practices in Community Supervision (EPICS), Thinking for Change (T4C), Aggression Replacement Training (ART) and several steps of Moral Reconation Therapy (MRT). In addition, they completed their program at New Life and successfully completed several classes through the Department of Human Services. Entering into the program, their goal was to rehabilitate themselves, so they could obtain custody of their child. In February 2024, they successfully completed their goal and gained custody of their child. This probationer overcame addiction and homelessness. They have been clean and sober for 1 year and 3 months. They currently live with family and have been very supportive throughout the process.

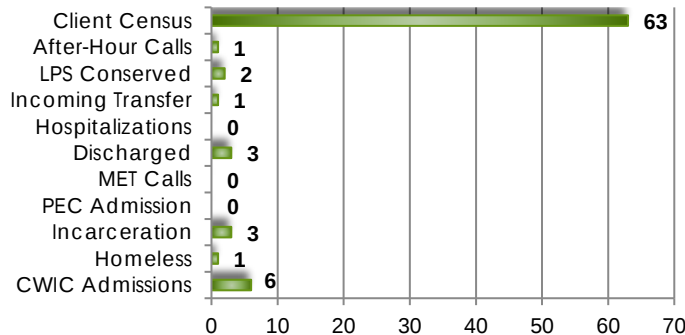
MH Data and Outcomes (n=29)



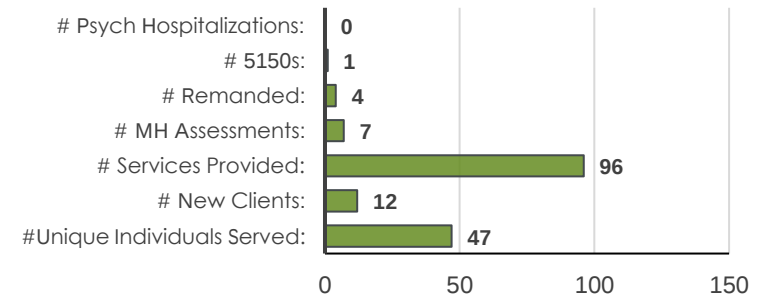
SUD Data and Outcomes (n=17 prior Tx; n=10 since Tx)

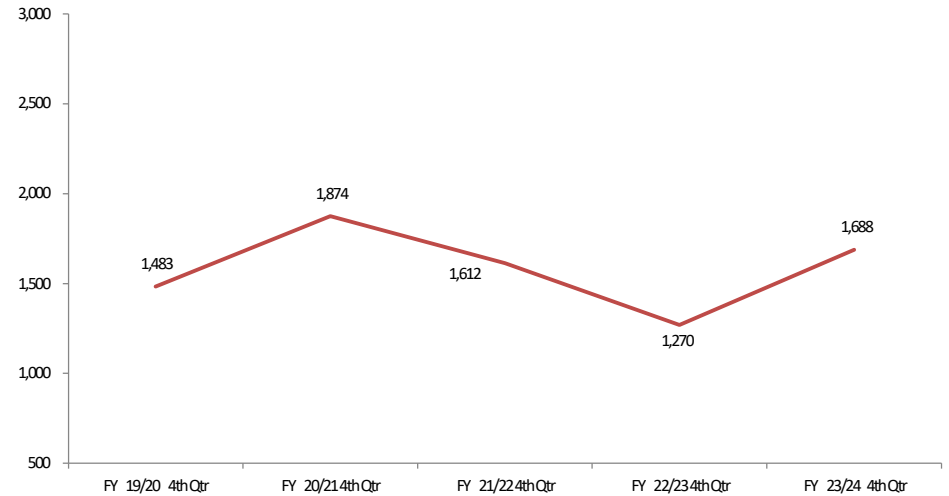
An AB 109 assigned individual received behavioral health services from the Supportive Pathways Opportunities (SPO) team for one year. Upon initial engagement, the individual experienced severe symptoms of paranoia, irritability, and disorganization. This individual did not have a support system due to strained familial relationships. During engagement, they were housed at a Sober Living Environment, where staff was supportive and proactive with linkage to a primary care provider, dental and vision care. Throughout the course of treatment, the individual reconnected with their parents and used weekend passes to visit his parents' home in Tehachapi. This individual successfully graduated from SPO, with both parents in attendance for support. Individual was subsequently linked to College Community Services Tehachapi to be closer to family. Today, the client remains engaged with CCS Tehachapi and continues to make progress.



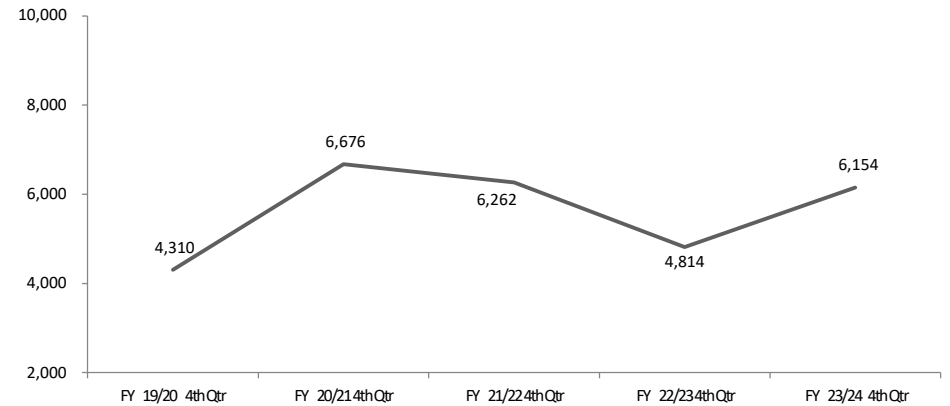

Success Stories and Annual Summary

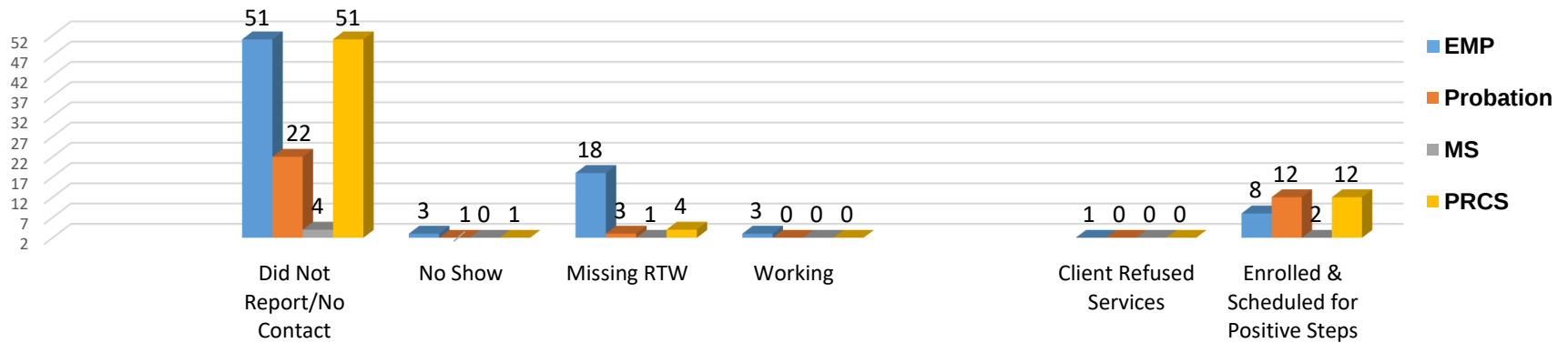
During the 4th Quarter, 30 individuals were placed in either employment or training. Out of this group, 6 individuals were newly enrolled into Paid-Work-Experience (PWEX), 5 individuals that were enrolled in the previous quarter are in the process of completing their hours, one individual left PWEX early due to obtaining full-time employment, another individual enrolled into an On-The-Job Training (OTJs) contract where the participant is expected to be retained and unsubsidized at the conclusion of the training period, and finally one additional participant enrolled at Bakersfield College. Throughout these four quarters, we have received 806 net referrals, enrolled 139 participants, had 41 complete the Work-Readiness program at Lerdo, enrolled 133 into Post-Custody Positive Steps program, administered 645 GED test modules, and placed 85 clients in either unsubsidized employment, training (including PWEX and OTJs), or post-secondary education (61% placement rate for those enrolled, not including enrollees still actively job searching). Our AB 109 clients are obtaining more jobs that pay well at companies with opportunities for advancement and are successfully enrolling in post-secondary education – key to reducing recidivism.

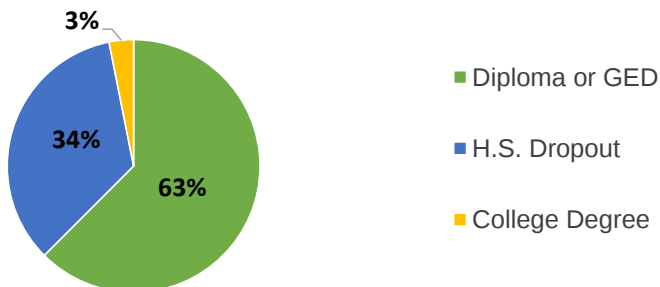

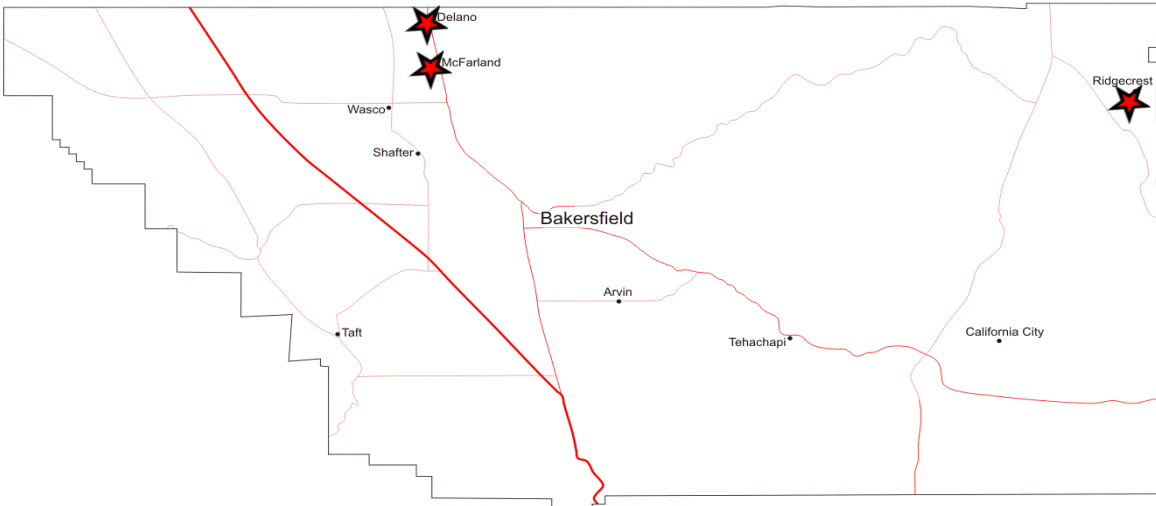
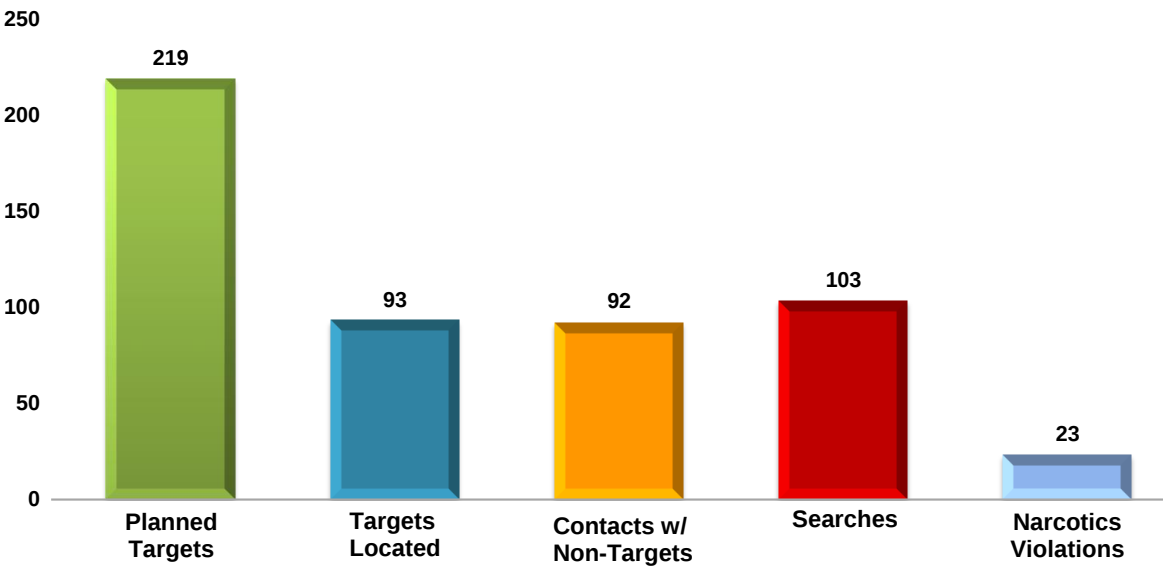
Enrollees' Education Level

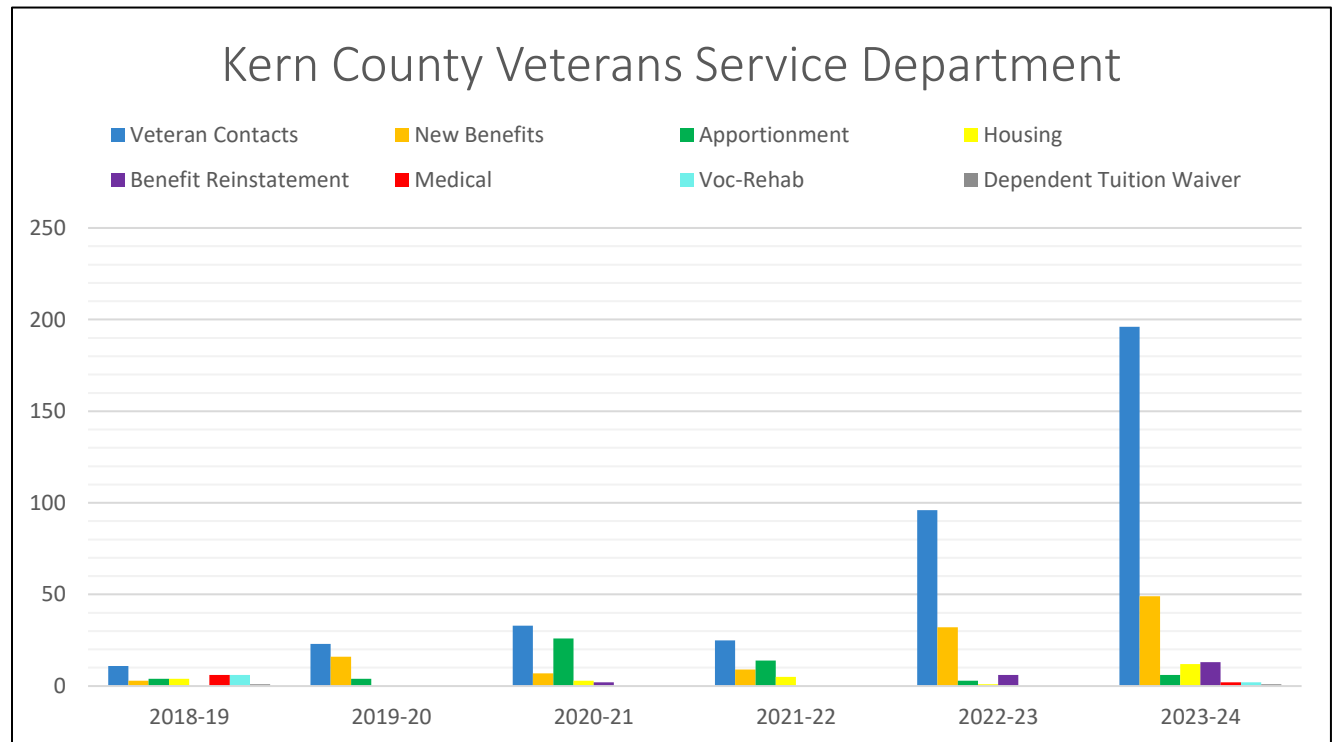

The Kern County Veterans Service Department (KCVSD) has a dedicated Veterans Service Representative (VSR) designated to provide benefit advocacy and case management to veterans (and their families) at any stage in the criminal justice system. The initiative provides access to Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits, California Department of Veterans Affairs benefits, as well as referrals to other community groups in an effort to eliminate barriers to successful reintegration into the community and reduce the recidivism rate of veteran offenders.

Title: **EMPLOYERS' TRAINING RESOURCE REQUEST FOR
ALLOCATION FROM CONTINGENCY FUND**

Background: Employers' Training Resource (ETR) is requesting \$46,035 from the Community Corrections Partnership's (CCP's) Contingency Fund to backfill a shortage in the amount obligated in a Career Catalyst Agreement for Paid Work Experience (PWEX) wages and Employer of Record services, plus associated Supportive Services to participants paid directly by ETR.

ETR's PWEX program was re-introduced in January after being suspended during the pandemic. We ended PY 2023-24 with 139 enrollments (target 100) and 24 placements into PWEX. We obligated \$200,000 in a contract for Career Catalyst Services to cover the wages and Employer of Record services for 16 participants for up to 480 hours of paid work experience each (reduced from 640 hours to reduce time to unsubsidized employment and allow us to serve more participants).

Due to the success of the program, we have only \$169,965 in unspent AB 109 funds-- short of the \$216,000 needed for the contract and associated Supportive Services. We expect this will only take us through the first half of the year but would like to wait to see what the impact of current negotiations between County and SEIU will have on our overall budget, as well as whether any additional Growth funding is made available by the State.

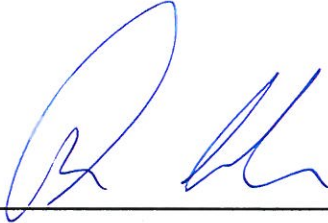
We continue to look for grant opportunities to supplement our AB 109 activities, especially PWEX; however, grants for justice-involved adults have requirements based on incarceration in and release from State prisons, not County jail systems, for example, requiring that workforce services began as early as six months prior to incarceration and continue with the same individuals on a post-custody basis.

We understand that PWEX is expensive and becomes more expensive every time minimum wage is increased, but we are seeing tremendous results with work site employers who have been willing to hire PWEX participants into unsubsidized jobs with opportunities for advancement. With "a job, a better job, and a career" being key to reducing recidivism, we believe it is in the best interest of our AB 109 clients that we continue to invest in PWEX with help from the Contingency Fund while we explore strategies for sustainability in the face of increasing costs.

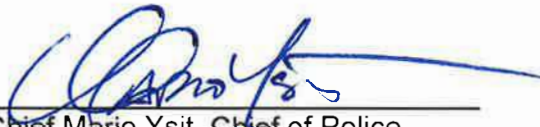
