The participant was enrolled in the Adult Program Center (APC) in October 2024. This participant completed Effective Practices in Community Supervision (EPICS) sessions and enrolled in Moral Reconciliation Therapy (MRT). Through the APC program, they were able to maintain their sobriety and learn communication skills. Their Probation Program Specialist has stated that this individual has an incredible determination and is proud of this participant's progress. The individual is currently working to obtain their GED certification, and their long-term objective is to become a drug and alcohol counselor to help others overcome addiction as they did. 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<p align="center"><b>Commitment to a Safe Community</b></p> <p>During the quarter, officers assigned to the Kern County Probation Department's Adult AB-109 Division Mandatory Supervision (MS) Unit conducted a home call in the 400 block of 15<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Delano, CA. Officers contacted a probationer, who is on active MS and Felony Probation (FP). During the search, officers located a 9mm semi-automatic handgun, a .45 caliber semi-automatic handgun, a 20-gauge Mossberg shotgun with various rounds of ammunition, Tan Tactical body armor, and 19 grams of suspected methamphetamine. As a result, the probationer was arrested for possession of a controlled substance, possession of ammunition by a prohibited person, possession of a firearm by a felon, possession of a controlled substances while armed, and possession of body armor by prohibited person. The Kern County Probation Department remains committed to our dual roles of opportunity and accountability.</p>

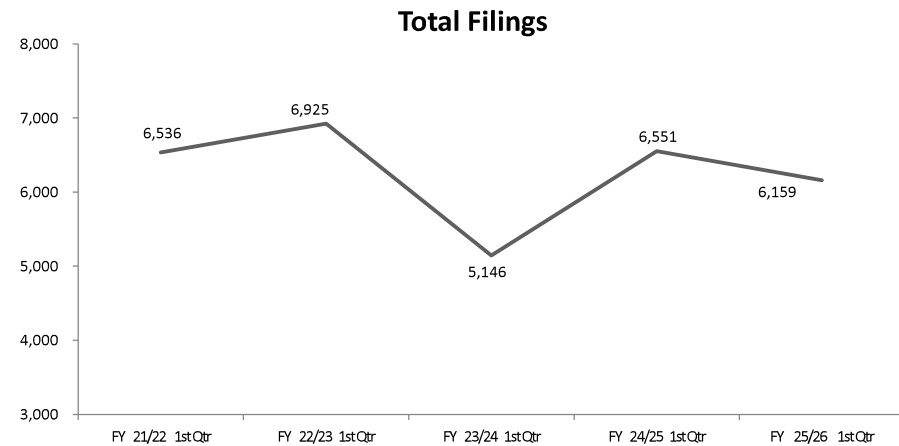
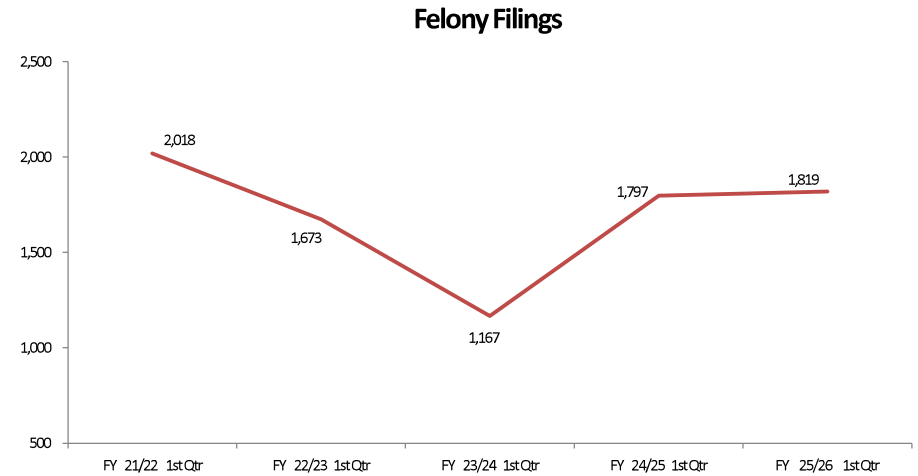
**Success Story**

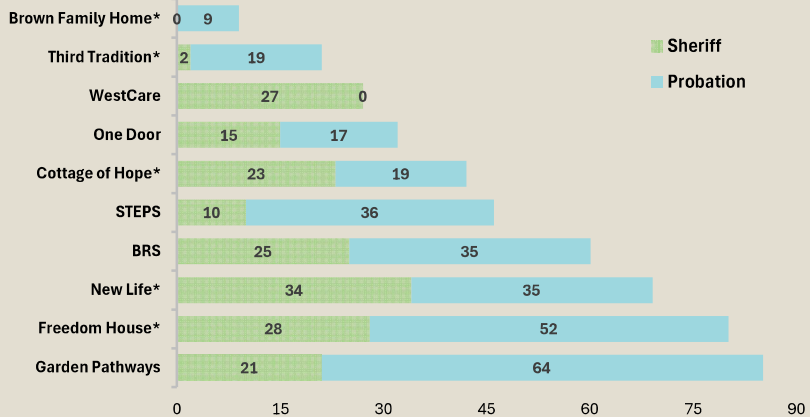

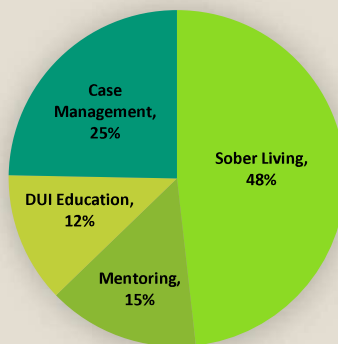

### Enrollments



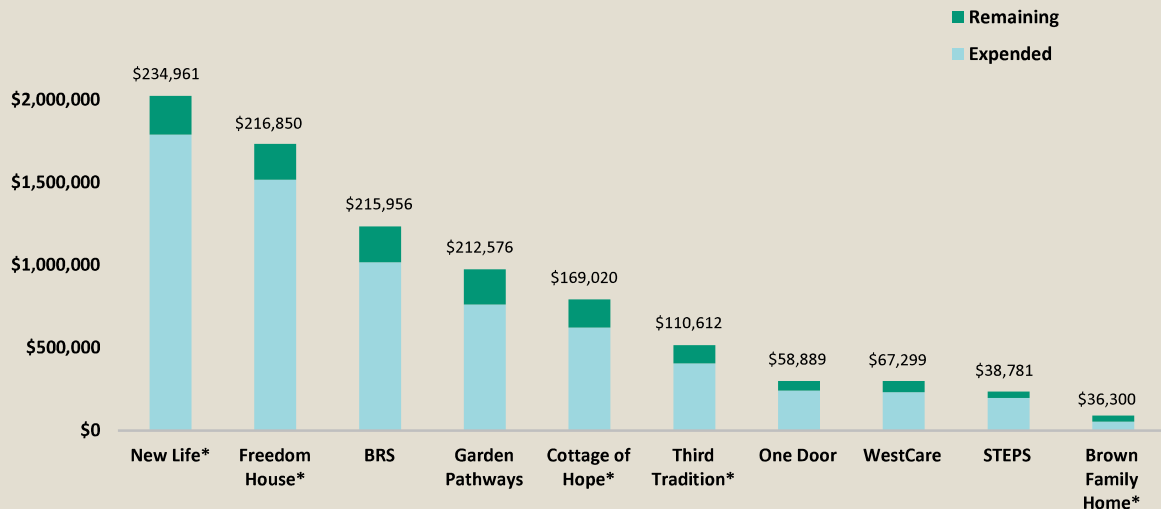
### Participants by Service Type



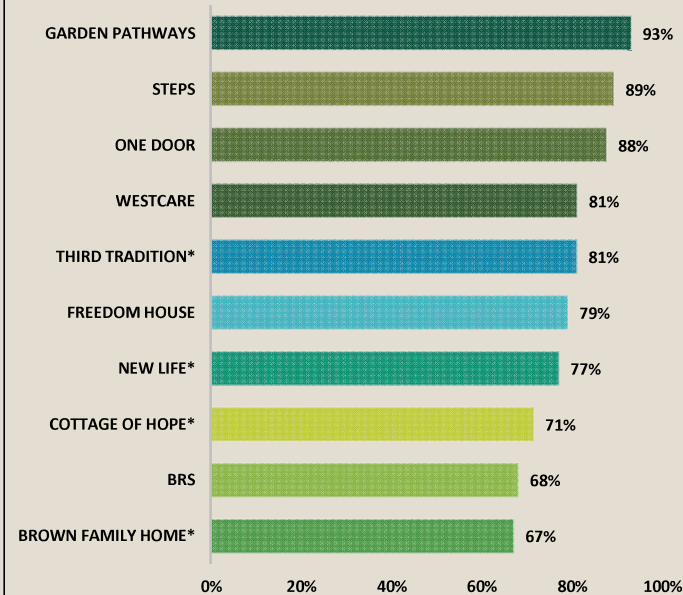
### Success Story

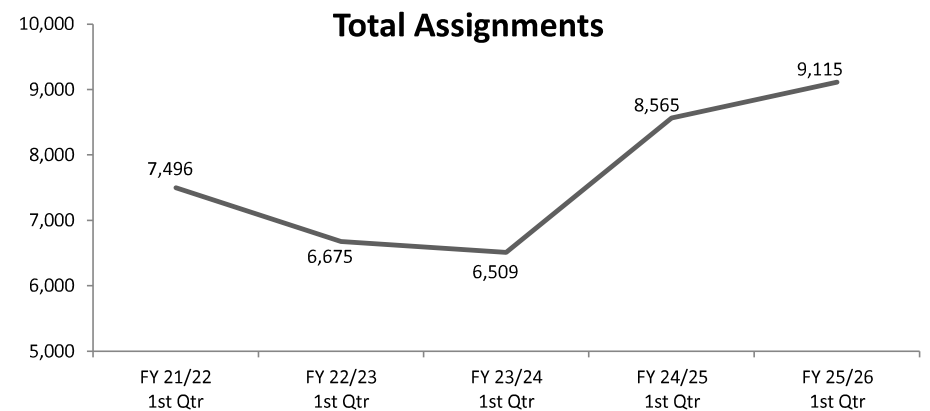
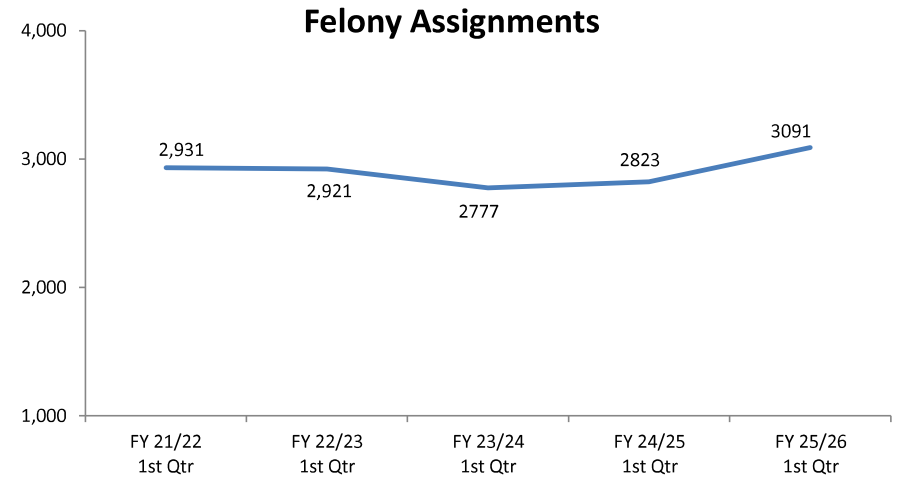

**Success Stories and Updates**

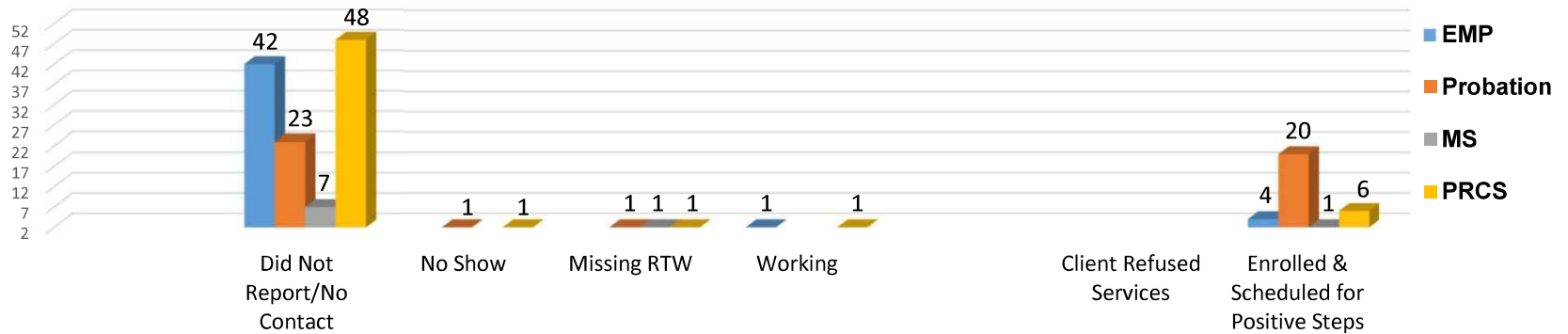
**SUCCESS STORY:** A Probation client, who was referred for services, applied for a job with a local employer. They were initially offered the job, however, the employer then rescinded the offer due to the individual's background. The client then spoke to the Re-Entry Services Representative about his experience with the employer. The Re-Entry Services Representative counseled the client on the Ban the Box law as well as how they can present their strengths for a follow-up interview. With this knowledge and mentorship, the client made an appointment with the employer to discuss why they should still be a candidate for the position in which they applied. The client was able to successfully obtain the job in his discussion with the employer and is now currently working.

**UPDATE:** Employers' Training Resource has done well this quarter by enrolling 25% of our annual enrollment goal for participants.

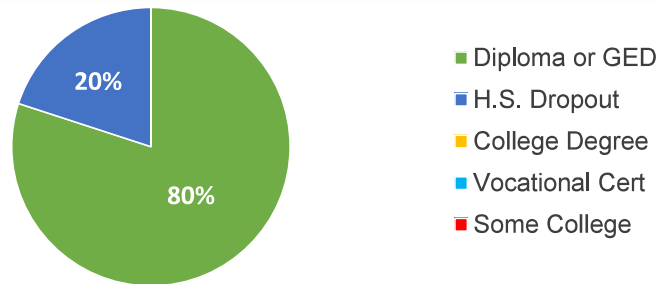

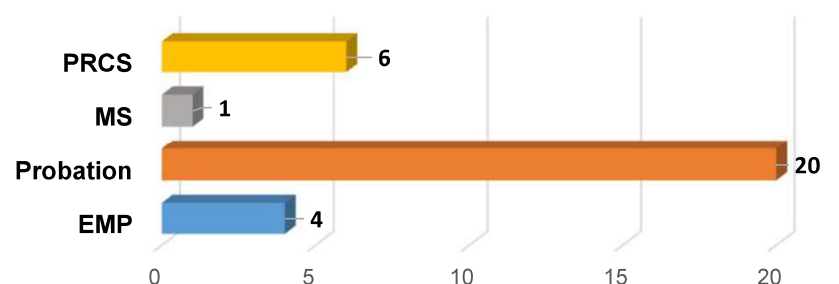
**Referral Status**

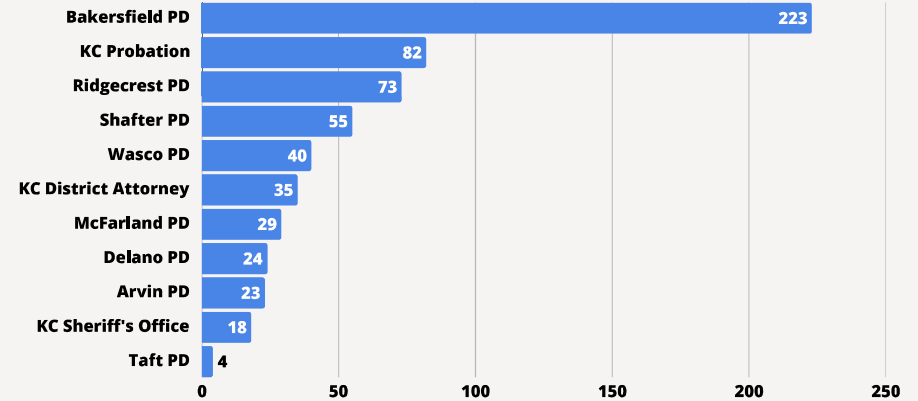

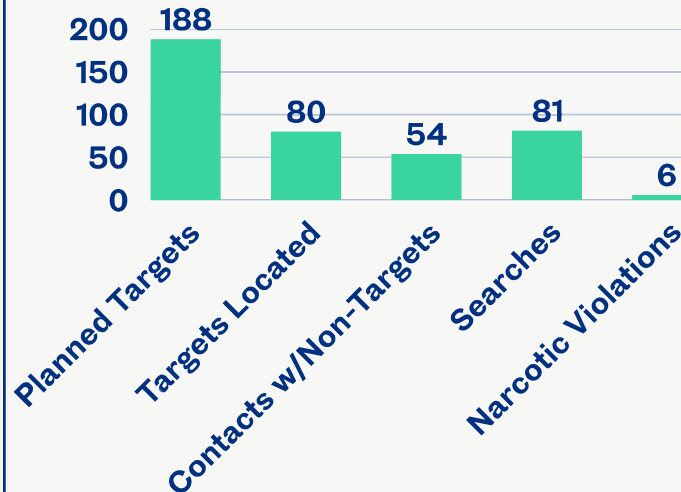

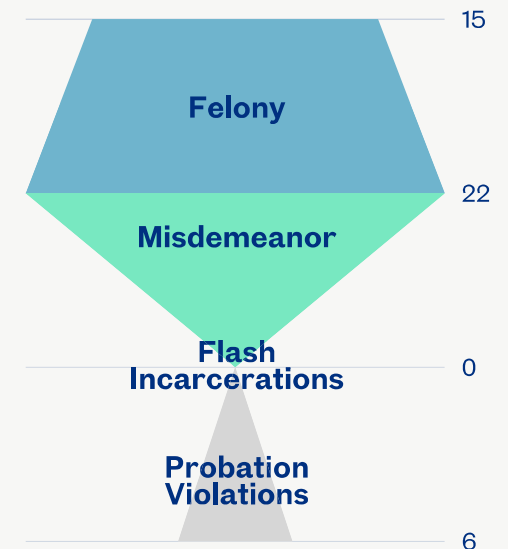

**Title:** REQUEST FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024/25 GROWTH FUNDS FOR STARTUP OF HORTICULTURAL CLASS AT LERDO FOR INCARCERATED PEOPLE

**Background:** The kern County Sheriff's Office is requesting a one-time allocation of \$80,328 to support the launch of a vocational horticultural program for Incarcerated Persons (IP) at the Lerdo Detentions Facility. This initiative is designed to provide meaningful job training aligned with Kern County's robust agricultural industry. The program will be delivered in partnership with the Bakersfield Adult School (BAS), which has a proven track record of successfully equipping IPs with valuable job skills that support reintegration and employment. The horticulture class will focus on cultivating fruits and vegetables, which will be used in the Lerdo cafeteria—where additional IP receive training in food service, further enhancing their vocational experience.

We have already secured \$84,000 toward this project and are seeking the remaining \$80,328 to finalize it. These funds will be used for essential infrastructure, including greenhouse construction, classroom materials, electrical work, and plumbing.

**SUBJECT:** Probation Department's Request for FY 24-25 Growth Funds

The Probation Department is requesting FY 24-25 Growth funds in the amount of \$500,000. The Department will use the funds for buildout improvements for a new "one-stop" location for the AB 109 Services Division and the Adult Probation Services Division.

Due to the growing demands of serving the AB 109 population, several years ago, the Department began researching a building that could house all adult supervision services in one location. Recently, an agreement was signed for a facility on 34<sup>th</sup> Street; however, the buildout costs for the building came in higher than the original cost. It is critical that the officers have an adequate environment to meet with offenders, provide the necessary services to redirect their behavior in a pro-social manner, and receive treatment and rehabilitation services through our Adult Programs and Supports. This can ease any transportation burdens on the offender, create less barriers when reporting to their officers and for treatment services, and ensure their rehabilitation needs are being met.

These funds will be used for items such as equipment, workstations, technology, and office furniture.
