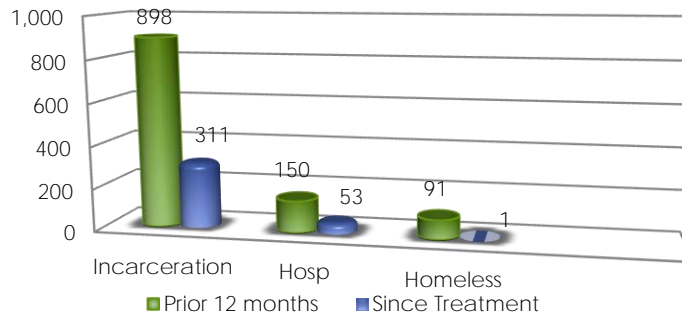

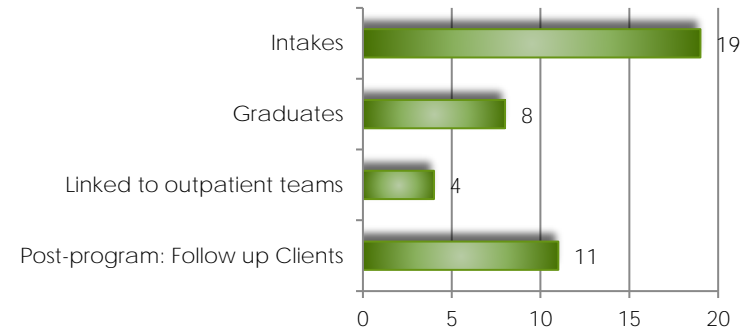

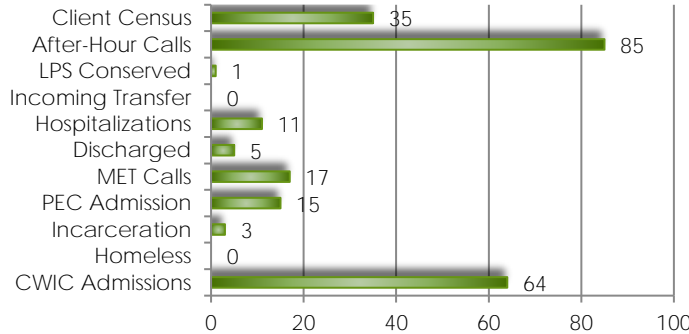
MH Data and Outcomes (n=11 prior; n= 45 since Tx)



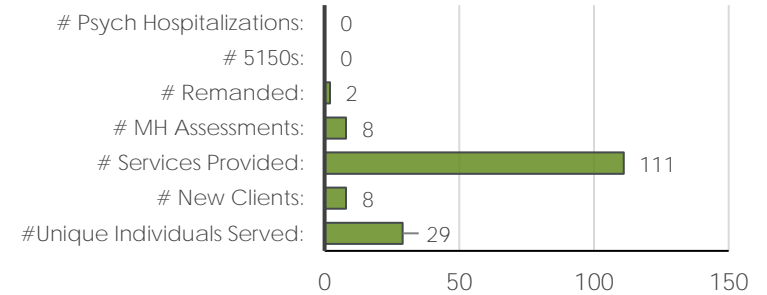
SUD Data and Outcomes

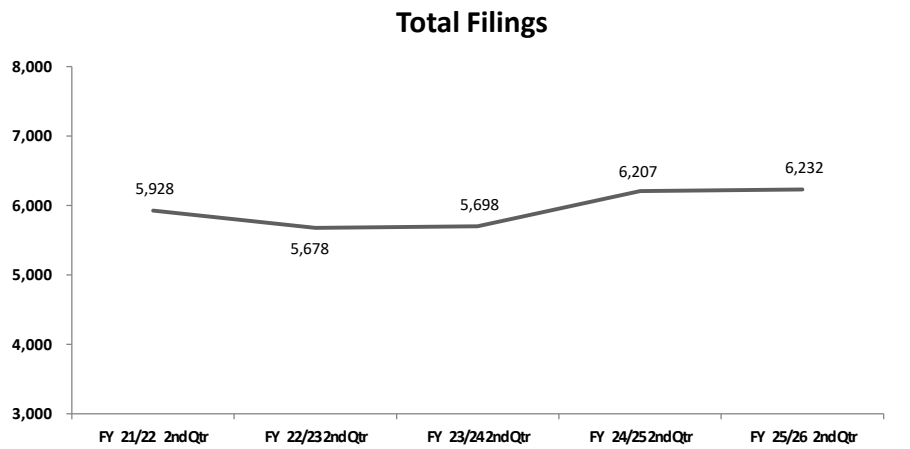
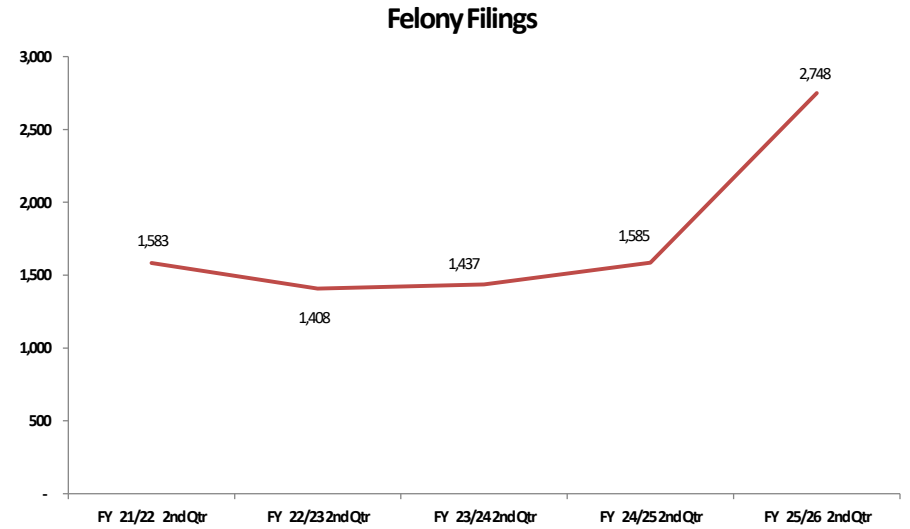
Success Story

This quarter, the co-response team made contact with an individual in crisis who required an emergency short Doyle assessment and linkage/collaboration with Correctional Behavioral Health and Authorizations to receive psychiatric medications. As a result of the team's community collaboration and linkage, the client is currently doing well and remains stable. Through follow up, the individual reported improvement in auditory hallucinations, has consistently tested clean from all substances, and is compliant with SLE and EMP requirements. Additionally, this individual has reconnected with family support and is regularly visiting their daughter, who is currently in her grandmother's custody. The individual has expressed gratitude to the team for responding with compassion and care during a vulnerable time.

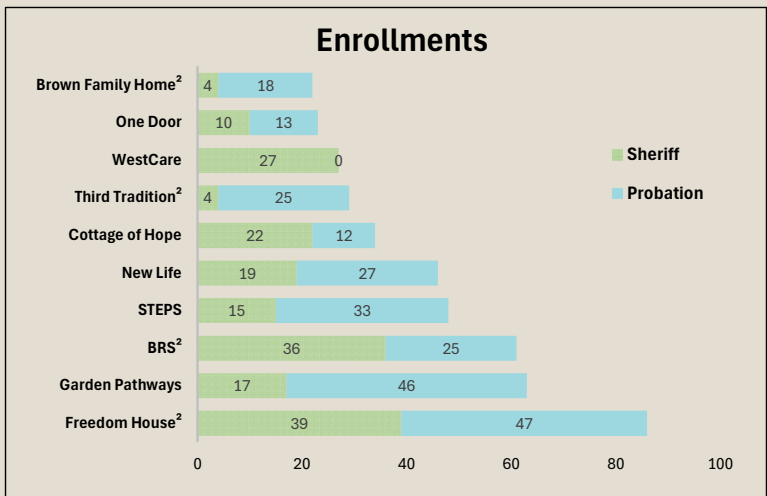

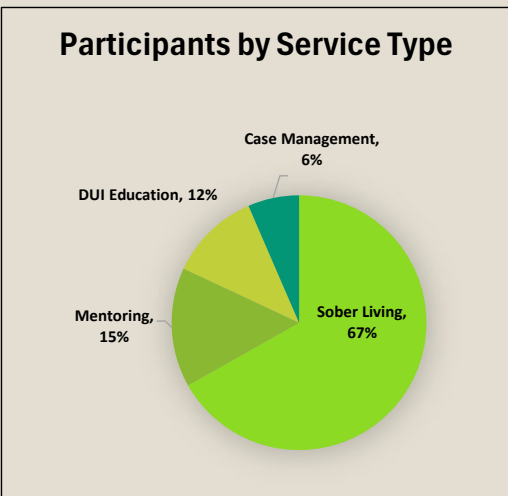

Enrollments



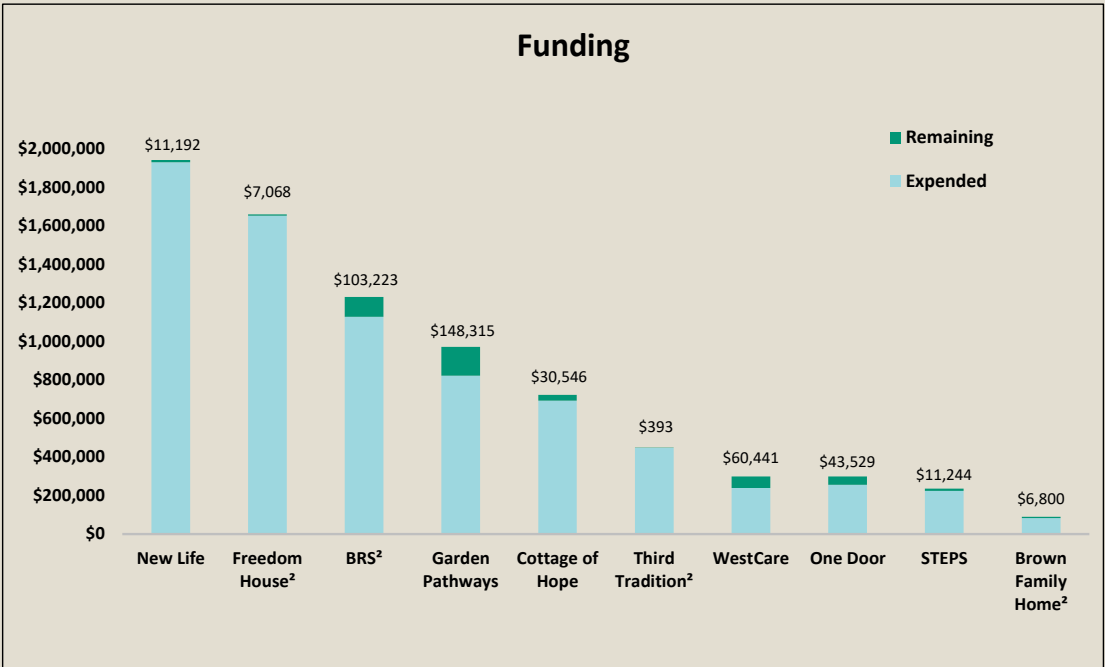
Participants by Service Type



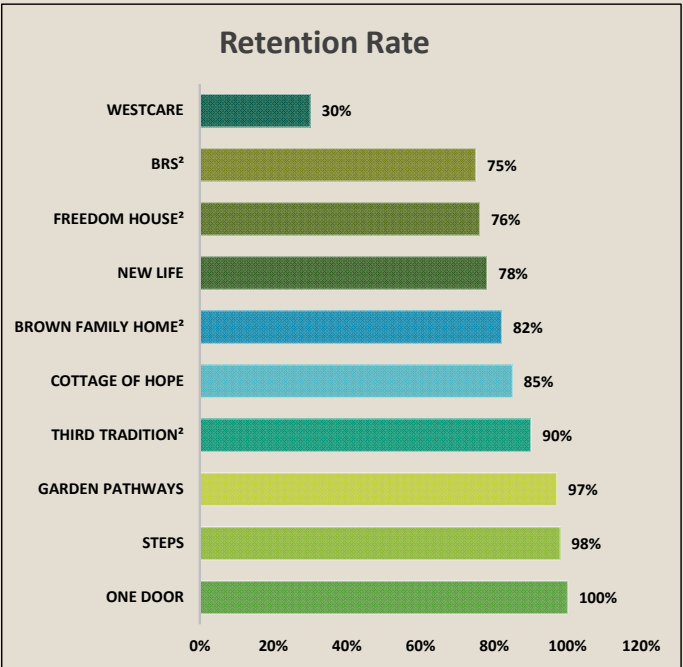
Success Story

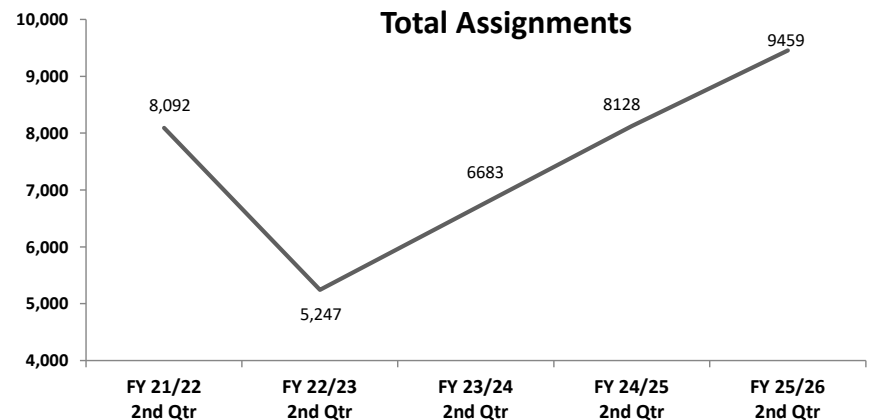
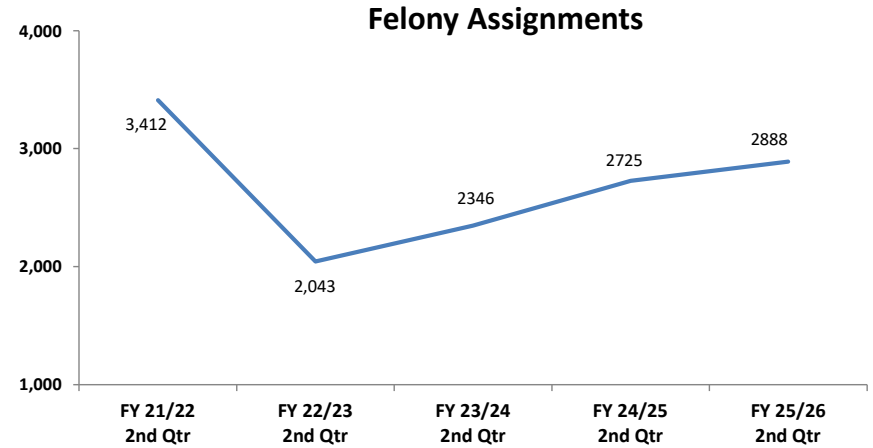

Success Stories and Updates

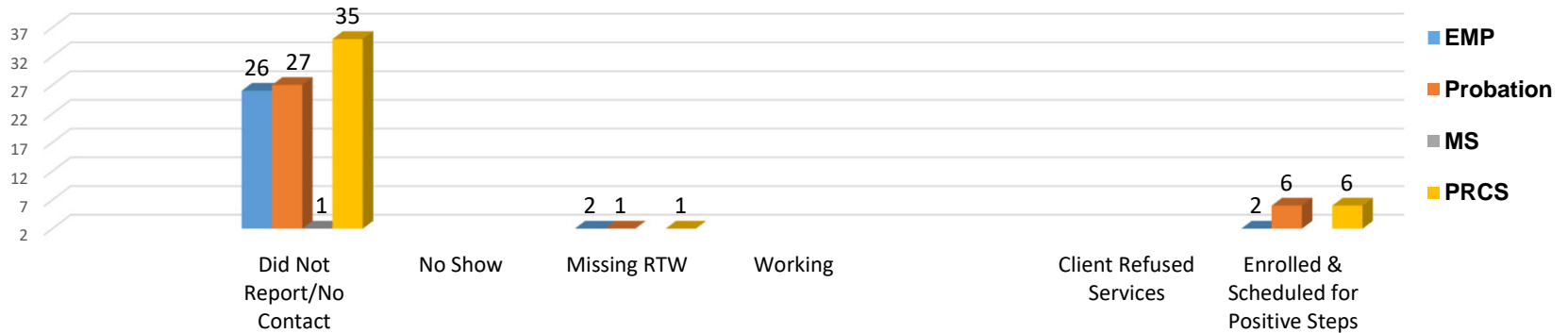
SUCCESS STORY: A participant that was referred to our agency for services on August 13, 2025. They were able to obtain employment with Caterpillar as a Warehouse Associate on November 12, 2025 earning \$18.45/hr. This participant's diligence paid off as they followed up on all of their job leads, are now working 40 hours a week, and are eligible for health benefits through the company.

UPDATE: In comparison to last quarter, there were 54.8% less enrollments and 25.8% less referrals to the program. In addition, a higher number of those referred to the program had less than a high school education (42% this quarter vs 20% last quarter). Due to the holidays, the second quarter is generally slower than the first quarter. ETR will need to enroll 40 participants for the 3rd and 4th quarter in order to reach the goal of 125 enrollments for the year.

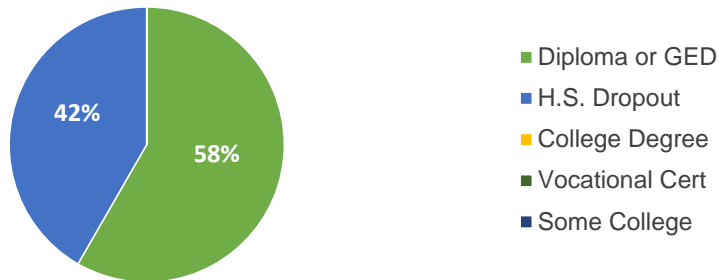

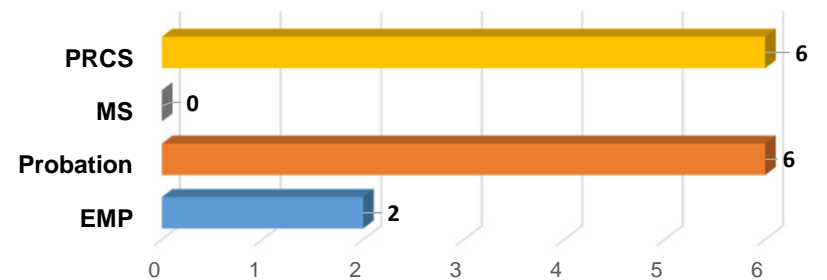
Referral Status

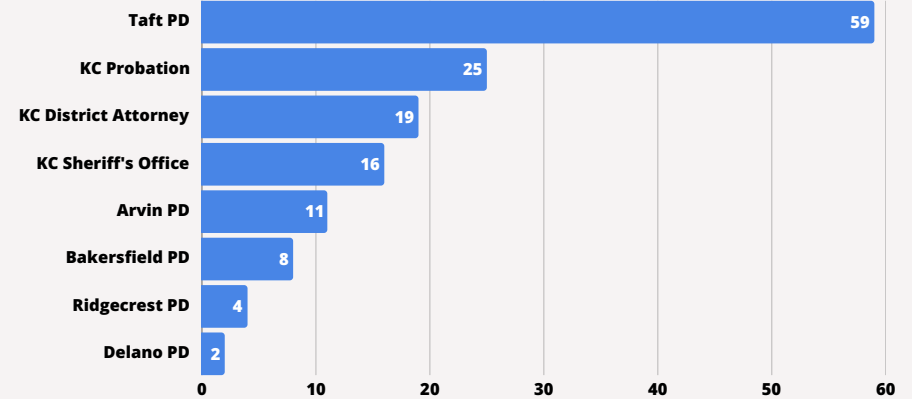

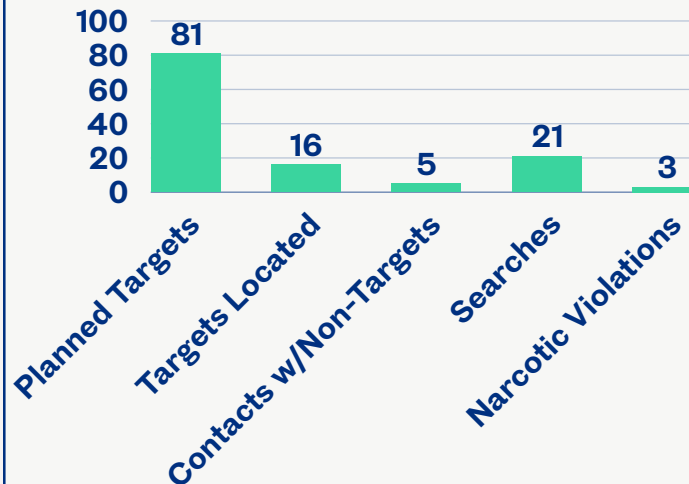

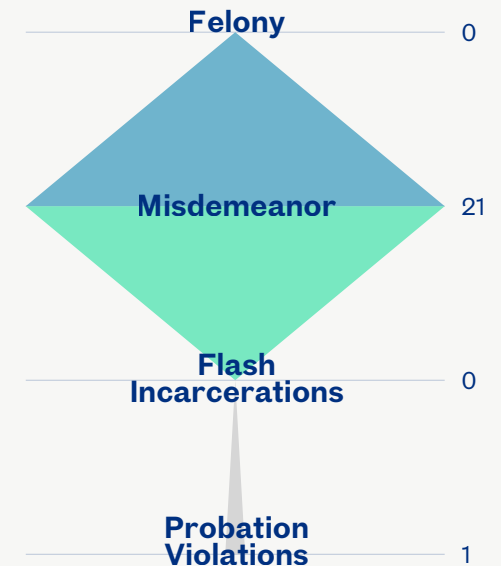

AB 109 DATA TRACKERS REPORT FY 25-26 QUARTER 2 (October 1, 2025 - December 31, 2025)

The Kern County Veterans Service Department (KCVSD) has a dedicated Veterans Service Representative (VSR) designated to provide benefit advocacy and case management to veterans (and their families) at any stage in the criminal justice system. The initiative provides access to Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) benefits, California Department of Veterans Affairs benefits, as well as referrals to other community groups in an effort to eliminate barriers to successful reintegration into the community and reduce the recidivism rate of veteran offenders.

Services Provided to Support Reintegration and Reduce Recidivism:

- Service-Connected Disability
- Apportionment
- Pension
- Medical
- Vocational Rehabilitation
- Housing Assistance
- CalVet Tuition Waiver for Dependents
- Benefit Reinstatement

KCVSD has established a direct line of communication to incarcerated veterans via Kern Valley State Prison psychologists; this provides an opportunity to assist these incarcerated veterans by filing claims related to psychological trauma suffered during their time in service. Staff and inmates have the means of communicating through Zoom on tablets provided by the state prison. Future goals of KCVSD is to develop similar connections within other institutions throughout Kern County.
